Sam Harrison
BA (Hons) Business Studies

Sam spent his placement year working for Canadian company UrtheCast, which runs and owns the remote imaging cameras on the International Space Station. Sam was based in their San Francisco office, and also visited their HO in Vancouver.

"The highlight of my placement was getting to decide a location to film with the IRIS Camera, which is attached to the International Space Station. Knowing that my decision may be seen by astronauts on the Space Station and potentially people around the world was an incredible feeling," Sam says.



Polly is part of the Microsoft team at the digital agency Wunderman, in Singapore.

"Taking a leap of faith to seek something that would test me a little further has been beyond worth it. I've made friends, travelled to other parts of Asia in the few spare moments that I have, and most importantly gained an international perspective on the industry I chose to study at university," Polly says.

Polly advises future students: "Don't just accept the easy options, choose something that you can learn and grow from and that, most importantly, excites you."



BA (Hons) Tourism Management

Laurie spent his year working at The Rainforest Retreat at the Mojo Plantation in India. It's a fully sustainable eco resort, and Laurie had the opportunity to get involved with a variety of roles.

"I led plantation tours, where I taught the guests about the agricultural practices of the organic spice plantation that the retreat is set on, and I also led guided treks that included bird watching and identifying other flora and fauna," Laurie says.

He adds: "My experience has definitely shaped me as a person, given me confidence and enabled me to understand the career in which I'd like to progress."

An insight into university life

Going to university is a big decision, let alone narrowing down course options. To help support your students as they begin mapping out their future, we are proud to be offering our popular Insight Days again for 2016.

U Insight Days have a subject-specific focus across 13 subject areas, giving your students in Year 10 and above the opportunity to explore their options. Aside from exploring course options, your students will get an insight into what studying at university is like. They'll be able to meet current students as they take a campus tour, and see where they could be studying in a few years' time.

A typical Insight Day runs from 10am – 1pm, and includes subject-specific activities, a student life talk and broader sessions about higher education.

For students with a clear idea of what they'd like to study, Insight Days are the perfect opportunity to get a glimpse into their future. Many students won't have made that decision, and may not even be sure if university is for them; this is a chance to explore those choices and get some hands-on experience.

How to make UCAS applications stand out

You're already supporting your students in achieving academically, but for many courses we look for something extra. We've picked out two subject areas, and would like to share some tips for boosting UCAS applications with extra-curricular activities.

Design & Engineering



There are a number of things which can help your students' design and engineering applications stand out. They will be required to provide a portfolio of work if they are invited to interview, so any preparation will be time well spent. We'd like to see the following for our different courses:

Product Design: We want to see creative ability and problem solving through things like drawings, school projects, model making and workshop activity.

Industrial Design: A portfolio needs to show 3D composition capabilities using materials such as wood, metal or plastic. Encourage your students to include life drawings and 3D modelling too.

Design Engineering: We'd like to see examples of your students' technical work. This could be science or technology related, from a school or external project at any level.

Aside from compiling a great portfolio, applicants can stand out by immersing themselves in the world of design and engineering. Students could attend exhibitions like New Designers, or our very own Festival of Design & Technology. They could subscribe to magazines like Blueprint, read the free online magazine Design Week and keep abreast of industry news by checking the IED website. Students can also make the best use of their time on social media by following Design Week and IED on Twitter.

Health & Social Sciences

For most health and social sciences courses, we want to see that your students work well with people, which is why we ask to see evidence of experience. In order to stand out from other candidates. students could tell us about relevant jobs, work experience or volunteering they have done. With over nine months before the deadline for 2017 applications, there's plenty of time to get that all important experience. Here are some ideas of where to start:

 Working with Beavers, Rainbows, Brownies, Cubs, Scouts and Girl Guide groups



- Helping in youth clubs/ projects and summer play schemes
- Helping with breastfeeding or mother and toddler groups
- Working with a school on peer support projects (reading schemes, buddying systems)
- Volunteering at a care home or hospital
- Volunteering at night shelters or soup kitchens

- Volunteering at tea and luncheon clubs at local churches
- Supporting Age Concern befriending schemes
- Working at charity shops
- GP volunteering schemes.

Students could also take part in activities that demonstrate an interest in the subject, for example reading journals or magazines relevant to the course they're interested in, such as Frontline (a magazine from the Chartered Society of Physiotherapy) or Nursing Times. They could also read articles around the NHS constitution which establishes the principles and values of the NHS.

What the new UCAS Tariff means for you

A lot is changing for applicants to undergraduate courses for September 2017. Our 2017 Undergraduate Prospectus includes details of all entry requirements in the new UCAS Tariff. It also features guidance about our offer making process, typically based on an applicant's three main graded qualifications, including any required subjects.

We are aware that some schools and colleges may no longer offer the AS-level and do not want any applicants to be disadvantaged as a result.

With that in mind, if a student doesn't have an additional AS-level, alongside three A-levels for example, we'll continue to consider them as we did before. Additional study may be valuable for breadth of knowledge and we will look at a range of qualifications and subjects, including the Extended Project Qualification and General Studies, although these may not be part of our offer.

If one of your students doesn't meet the criteria of their original offer, we may still offer a place. We will review the student's whole application and consider all academic qualifications (including those not included in the offer) and the rest of the application to see if they have the academic potential to succeed on the course. If we feel the answer is yes, we will still confirm their place.
