CoPMRE Symposium—Frailty: enhancing lives

Centre for Postgraduate Medical Research and Education (CoPMRE) tackles the topic of frailty

CoPMRE encourages and facilitates collaboration between the NHS and the university; BUCRU and CoP-MRE work very closely together.

In October CoPMRE held a symposium bringing together healthcare professionals, academics and industry voices to discuss the topic of frailty.

This was the sixteenth annual conference, with around 100 people in attendance. It explored the theme of Frailty: Enhancing Lives, covering areas such as the demographic and societal challenges, transition to frailty, and how technology could enhance the lives of the elderly.

Professor Martin Vernon, National Clinical Director for Older People at NHS England, was one of the keynote speakers at the event, talking about the NHS Long Term Plan and its ageing well programme.

He said: "It's really important because of the ageing population and the need to support many more people to age better and also to meet the needs of people in their communities in a much more proactive way. We're care by people, which is the most important part in doing that by bringing together primary care and community services in ways that the NHS has never done before."



He added that it was important to bring together education, research and practice to support and develop the health and social care system.

The second keynote speaker was Professor Mark Hawley, Professor of Health Services Research at the University of Sheffield, who spoke about how technology could enhance the lives of older people with frailty and enable them to continue living independently for longer.


"I'd like people to get a feel for how technology could enhance the lives of older people and how they might be able to think about the use of technology alongside providing services and care for other people," he said.

"Meetings like this are key to sharing information and finding out what's new - I've learnt an awful lot already."

Other speakers at the day-long event were from organisations including Dorset Healthcare, Poole and Royal Bournemouth and Christchurch Hospitals NHS Foundation Trusts, and the Wessex Academic Health Science Network (AHSN), alongside academics from Bournemouth University.

CoPMRE manager Audrey Dixon, who organised the symposium, said: "The conference acts as a platform to showcase what is happening at BU and in Dorset and nationwide to promote wellness and economic benefits. Our aim is to develop a culture of collaborative and multidisciplinary research to drive income, esteem and impact for the benefit of patients."



Vanessa Heaslip also presented some of the work she and Debbie Holley have been undertaking as part of the ongoing research initiatives to support the key research agenda set by Dorset CCG. Their presentation focussed on how isolation can be conceptualised not only as physical isolation, but could also be applied very locally to those living with frailty. A range of technology 'ideas for the future' were suggested, and the importance of partner-ship working.

New publication with Dorchester Kidney Team



- Helping researchers from the University and from the NHS with developing high quality applications for external research funding (including small grants) – free of charge via NIHR RDS, Bournemouth office based in BU-CRU
- Ongoing involvement in funded research projects
- A "pay-as-you-go" research service for other projects
- Developing our own research programme

BUCRU supports Bournemouth University staff and researchers working locally in the NHS. There are no restrictions on topic area or professional background of the researcher. BUCRU is partly funded by the National Institute for Health Research (NIHR) and incorporates the Dorset office of the NIHR RDS SW (Research Design Service South West).

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
