Important:

Apply using your personal email address rather than a school/college one – it's easier to keep in touch and for when you finish school/college.



How to find and apply to UK universities

Searching for the right universities to apply to can be overwhelming.

We ask some first year students for their advice on how to pick a university, applying through UCAS, writing your personal statement, interview tips, and more.

Your application

- Maximum of **5 choices**
- **Choice restrictions** in specific subject areas
 - Medicine
 - Veterinary Medicine
 - Dentistry
- **Simultaneous consideration**, but with 'invisibility' from your other choices
- **£28.95** for 2026 entry | **£34.50** for 2027 entry
- **Codes (Institution, Course, Campus)** – make sure you get them right:

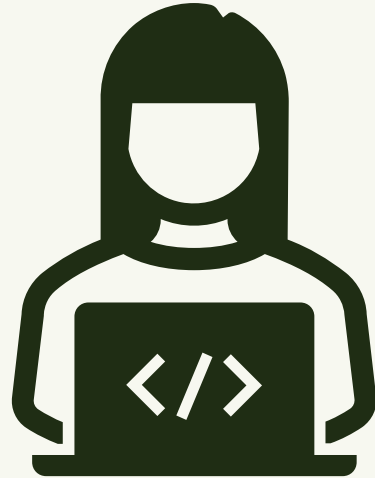

5 sections

- Education
- Employment
- Extra activities
- Choices
- **Personal statement**



Nominated access: You can nominate someone to discuss your application on your behalf.



Your personal statement

- 4,000 characters/approx.
- 650 words.
- split across three questions.

Personal Statement Builder on your UCAS Hub home page

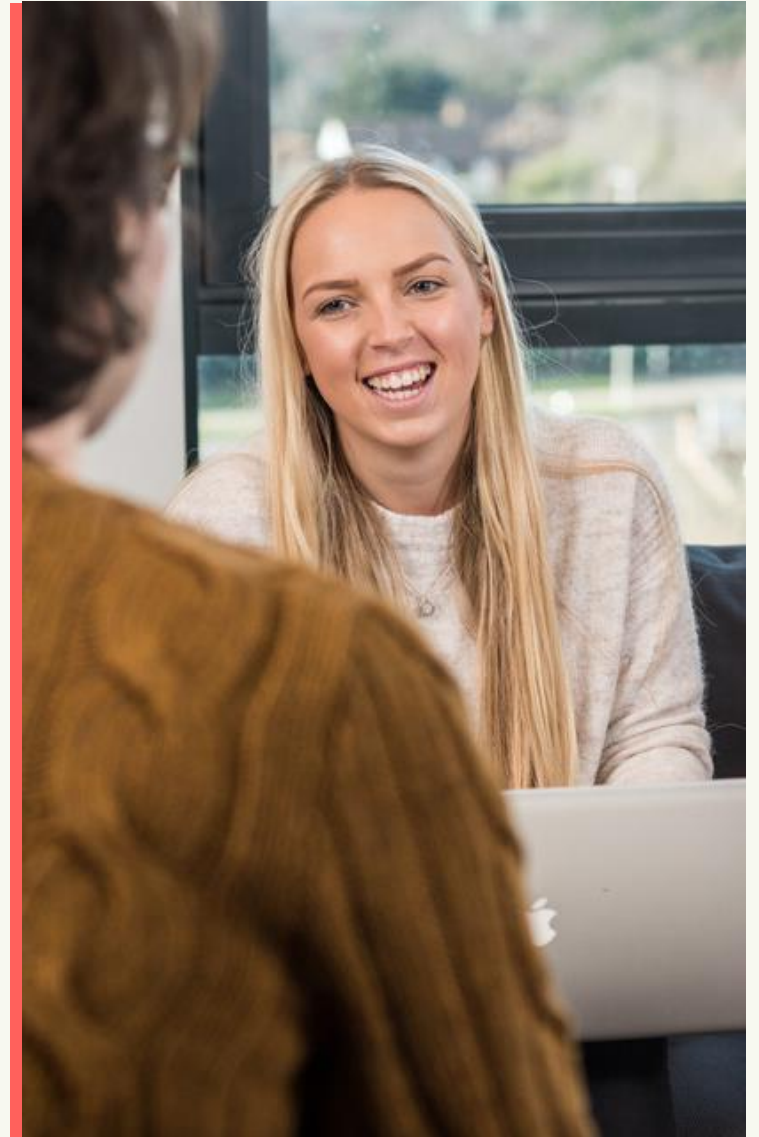
- Q1: Why do you want to study this course or subject?
- Q2: How have your qualifications and studies helped you to prepare for this course or subject?
- Q3: What else have you done to prepare outside of education, and why are these experiences useful?

AI: should you use it?

Your personal statement should feel **naturally you!**

- **Generating most/all = cheating.** You'll complete a declaration to confirm authenticity when you apply.
- **Inspiration, ideas, & checking readability** – probably ok (check individual unis).

Start early & be authentic. Let your true personality and passion shine.



Personal statement tips

Share your experiences

Explain how they've helped you grow and prepared you for the course.

Focus on the subject

Adopt the 80/20 rule – 80% about the subject and 20% on your extracurriculars.

What matters to you?

Show how your values and skills fit the course/profession you're applying to.

Be clear and concise

You only have 650 words so make them count!

Proofread

Check, check, and check again!
Always get someone you trust to give feedback.

Make it naturally you!

Unis and UCAS will identify plagiarised and AI generated content. Be your authentic self in your personal statement.

Additional information

Occupational health checks

Questionnaire needs to be completed fully and honestly. Confidential process and assessed individually.

Disclosure Barring Service (DBS) Enhanced Disclosure

It is essential that you are open and honest about any previous convictions, even if they are 'spent'.

Check the entry requirements for your course if you're unsure.

02: Fees & Funding



The cost of study

- **Tuition Fee Loan** to cover full fee
- Students do not start repayment until income is over £25,000 a year
- Alternatively, you can pay the university directly in a single lump sum or two instalments

Please note

- The figures shown are for 2026 entry and provided as a guide.
- 2027 entry fees will be confirmed closer to enrolment on the BU website and at www.gov.uk/student-finance
- Tuition fees will increase each year, in line with government rules and RPI-X (a measure of inflation).
- This increase still needs government approval. We'll update fees once confirmed.

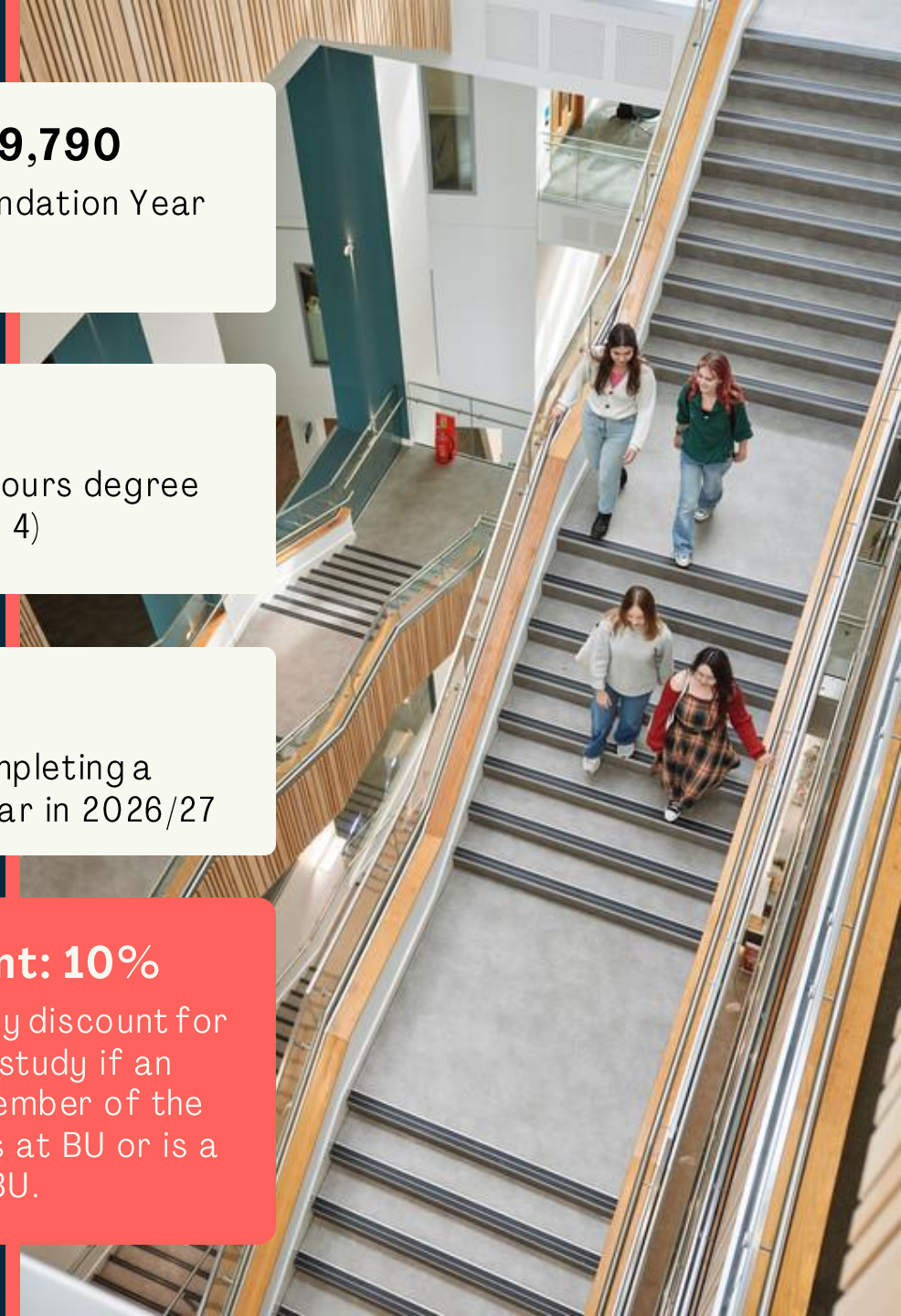

Maintenance Loan

Maintenance Loans are for day-to-day costs - typically accommodation, travel, domestic bills etc. They are paid in three instalments (one each term)

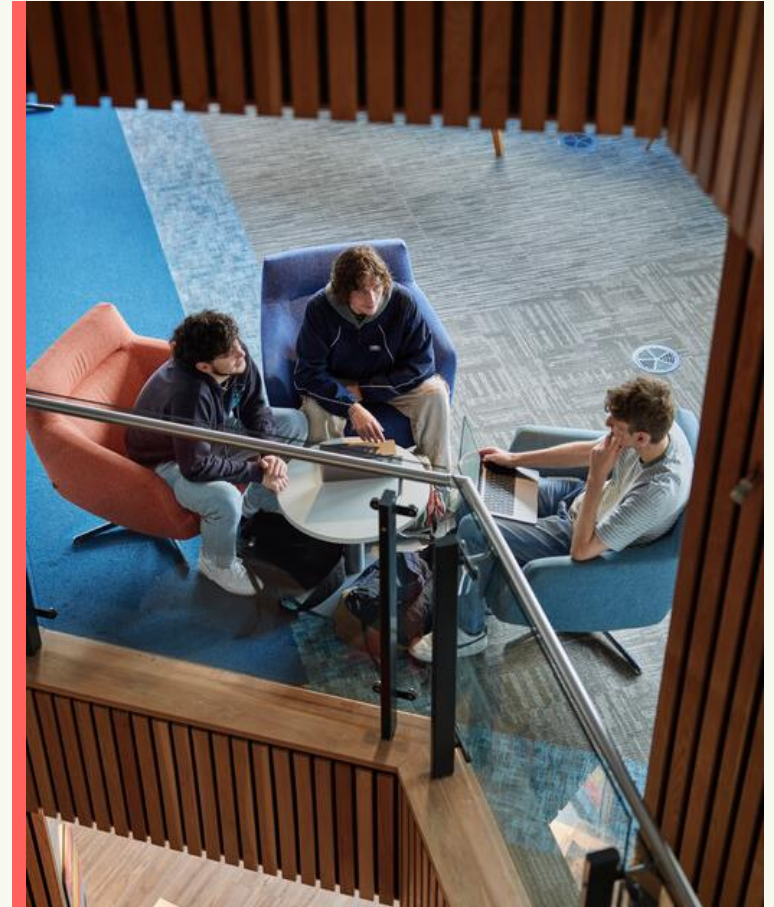

45% is non-income assessed

55% is based on household income

- **Maintenance Loans are available** whilst you are on a paid or unpaid placement.
- They are not means-tested and depend **where you are living** during your placement.



Maintenance Loan

46-week courses

Maintenance Loans are for day-to-day costs - typically accommodation, travel, domestic bills etc. They are paid in three instalments (one each term)



Up to £13,382 living away from home (not in London)



Up to £10,812 living at home

45% is non-income assessed

55% is based on household income



Paying back your loan

- Repayments begin the **April after you graduate**, and only if your income is above the threshold.
- Interest accrues on the loan **from the moment you take it out** and until it is repaid.
- Repay 9% of your income above £25,000 (before tax) for **40 years max**, after which any remainder is written off.

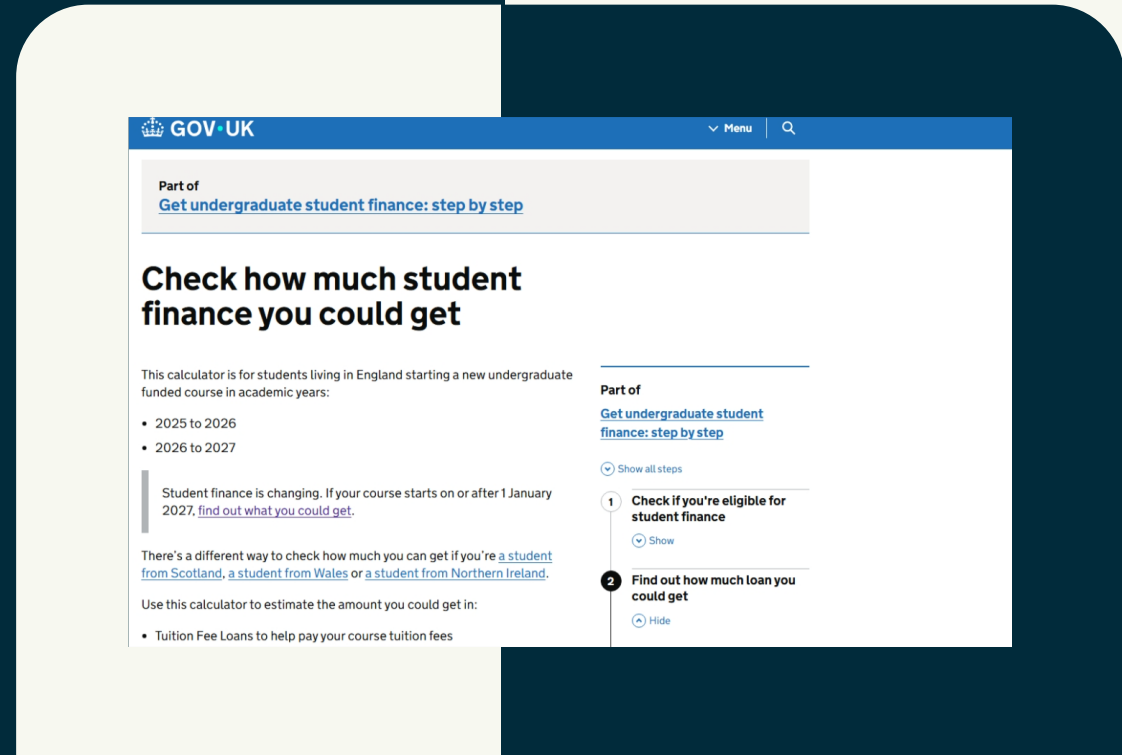

NHS funding

Up to £8,000

Per year (non-repayable)

Register for an online account via the **NHS Learning Support Fund** application system found on the NHS website

Learning Support Fund

- **£5,000 Training Grant for eligible courses**
 - £1,000 for specialist disciplines
 - £2,000 parental support
 - Paid in three instalments
 - **Must apply within six-months of starting study and reapply each year**
 - Courses covered: Midwifery, Nursing, Occupational Therapy, Operating Department Practice, Paramedic Science and Physiotherapy

Up to £3,000

Per year (non-repayable)

Exceptional Support Fund

- Means tested grant for students facing financial hardship
- Apply through your NHS account with **the ESF claim form**
- You can apply more than once per year
- You can apply in any year of your studies, even if you have received the funding previously
- If your application is successful, payments are usually made in a lump sum within 15 days

NHS funding

Travel and Dual Accommodation Expenses

Travel

If your placement travel costs more than your usual trip to university from your term-time address, you can claim the extra amount per day.

Placement accommodation

You may be able to claim back the cost of temporary (secondary) accommodation needed for a compulsory placement.

- Up to £82.50 per night for commercial accommodation.
- Up to £37.50 per night for non-commercial accommodation.

You can claim via your NHS Learning Support Fund account

- Claims must be made **within six months** of the cost being incurred
- Payment usually arranged **within 20 working days** of receiving the form



NHS funding

BA(Hons) Social Work

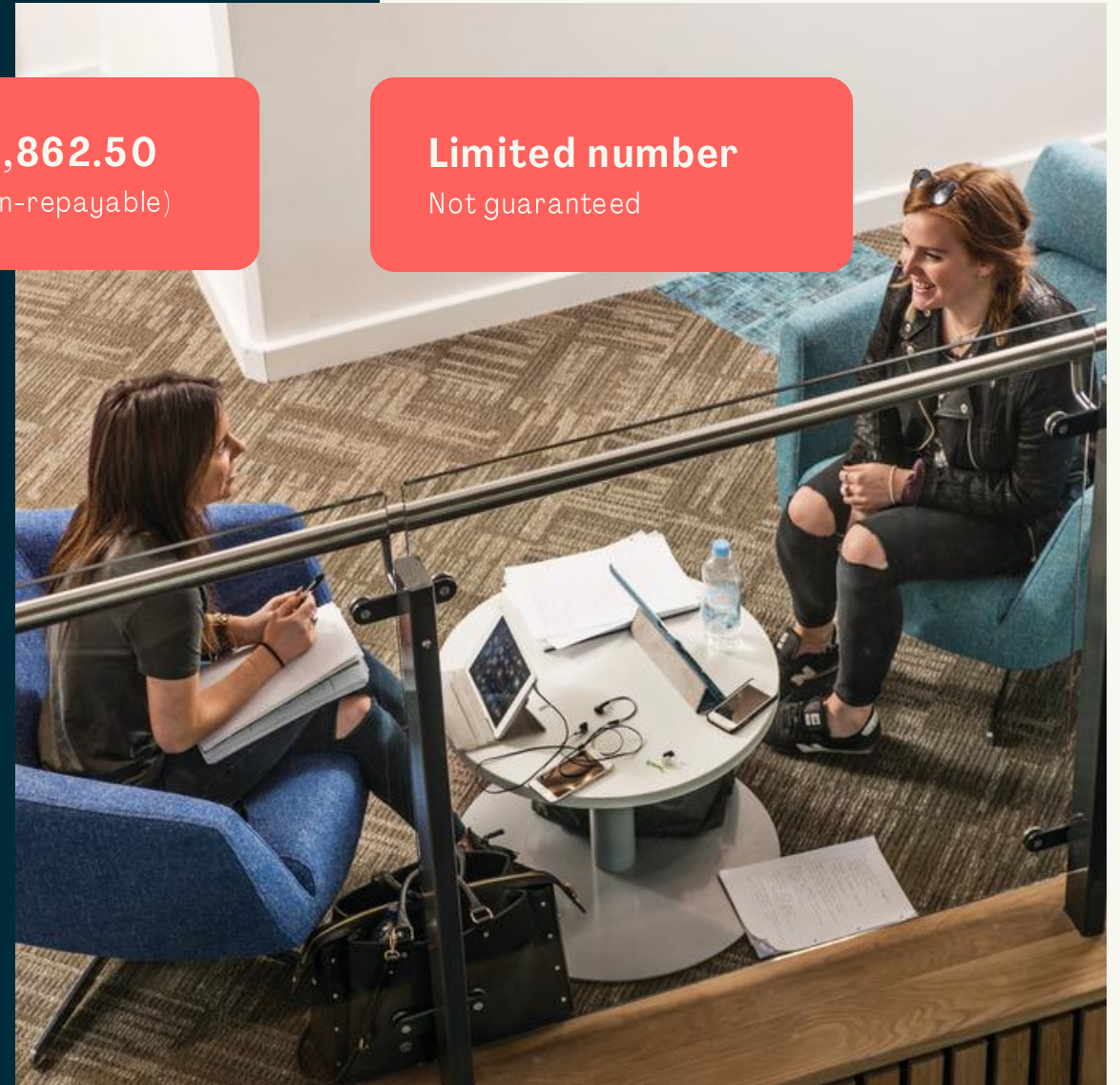
- This funding does not need to be repaid
- Students in their second and third year of study are eligible
- The number of bursaries are capped, so there is no guarantee
- You will need to apply via the MyFunding system at www.nhsbsa.nhs.uk
- If you're not eligible for the full bursary, you may still be awarded the placement travel allowance
- Paid in three instalments – one each term
- You will need to reapply each year
- £4,862 – Social Work bursary + £862.50 placement travel allowance (if studying outside of London)

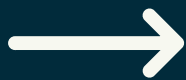

Bursaries and scholarships from BU

- ✓ **Support directly from BU** – it's additional to your student loan

What additional funding BU offer

Bursaries

Maintenance Bursary **Up to £2,400**

- £800 each year over 3 years of study
- For 'Home' fee status applicants:
 - living in England
 - household income up to £25,000

Care Leavers Bursary **Up to £9,000**

- £3,000 each year over 3 years of study
- For 'Home' fee status applicants:
 - living in England
 - have been in the care of the Local Authority for a period of 3 months or more
 - household income up to £25,000

Estrangement Bursary **Up to £9,000**

- £3,000 each year over 3 years of study
- For 'Home' fee status applicants:
 - living in England
 - have been estranged from their parents for 12 months or more
 - household income up to £25,000

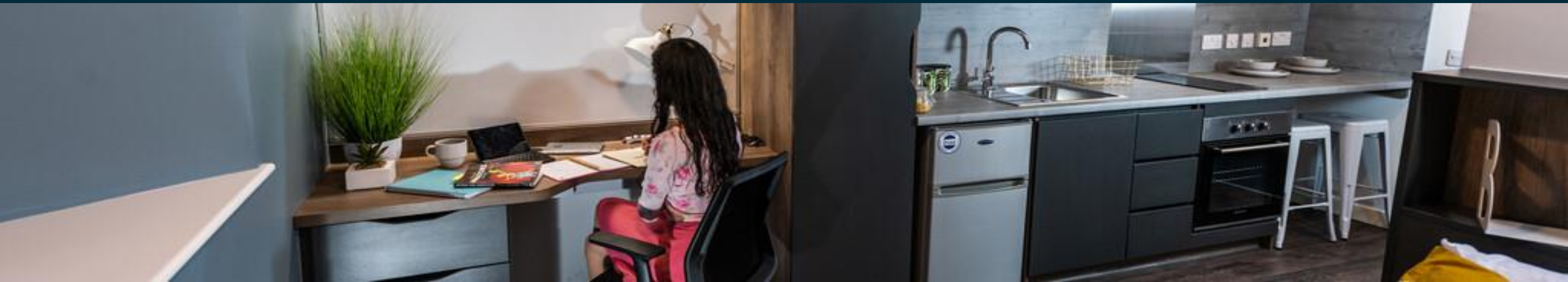

You may not be informed of your placement location until Summer, but Hospital accommodation can be simple & easy to arrange



Your home from home



If you are studying some of our Healthcare courses, you will require accommodation with a 50-week tenancy.



Alternatively, 40–42-week options are available, and you can opt for an additional summer let.



You can also choose to live in hospital accommodation at your placement site to help manage 24-hour shift patterns.

How do I arrange hospital accommodation?

You can decide if you want to live near campus and travel to your placement, or to live near your placement locality and travel to campus for lectures.

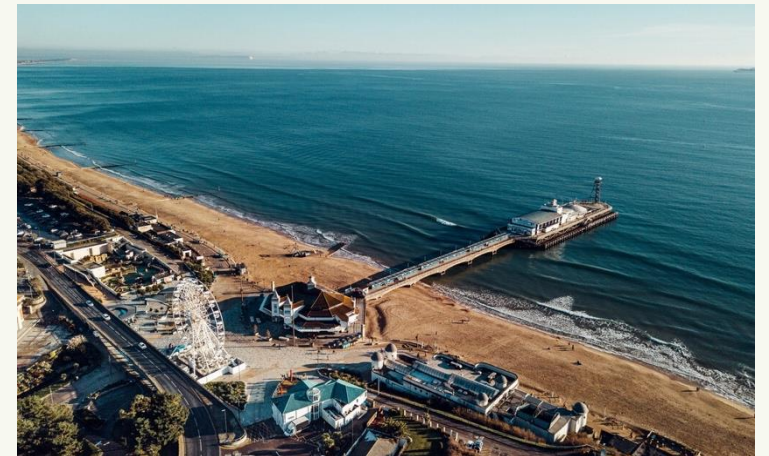
ResLifeBU is a programme to welcome, support and develop you through your first year living with us, whilst managing the health, safety and wellbeing of everybody living in the accommodation.

Step 1 – Make BU your firm choice.

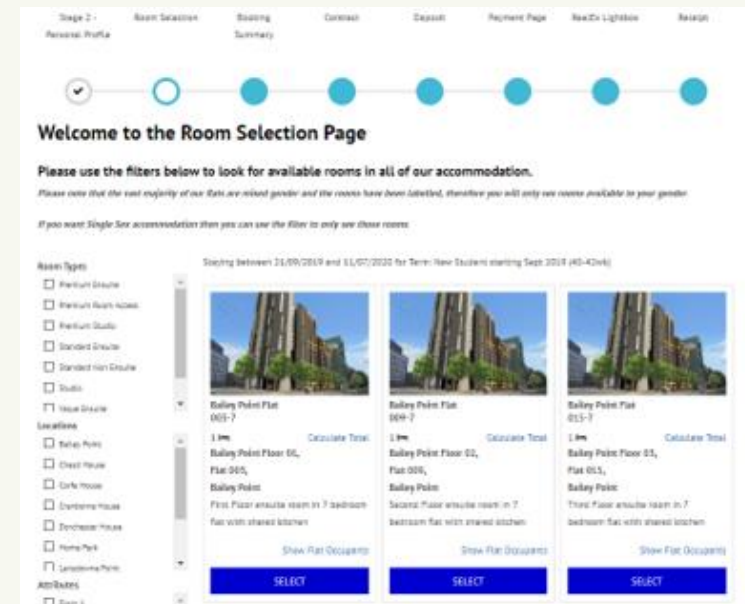
Step 2 – Register for the accommodation portal via the invitation link you will receive.
