# Pre and co-requisites

None

#### Aims

This unit aims to broaden and deepen the students understanding of the historical philosophical, theoretical and political influences on the development of modern adult nursing. The unit enables students to explore the core values that underpin the nursing framework philosophy from an adult nursing perspective and critically apply them to specific areas of clinical practice.

### Intended learning outcomes (ILOs)

Having completed this unit the student is expected to:

- 1. examine the historical and political influences that has impacted on the development of modern adult nursing.
- 2. critically analyse the philosophical influences on nursing practice
- 3. critically examine the ethical value base for nursing
- 4. Critically discuss theoretical models frameworks related to nursing and health care
- 5. critically examine current developments in nursing and strategies for future development

## Learning and teaching methods

The unit will be delivered through lectures and seminars. Students will be expected to participate in weekly seminar debates, presentations and discussions on the subject areas identified. Twenty five hours of the contact time will focus on seminar discussion with five hours on lectures. The students will be expected to undertake a large proportion of self-managed learning in order to prepare for the seminar work and guidance will be given for pre-reading. The remaining five hours will be allocated for face to face tutorials and assessment preparation.
