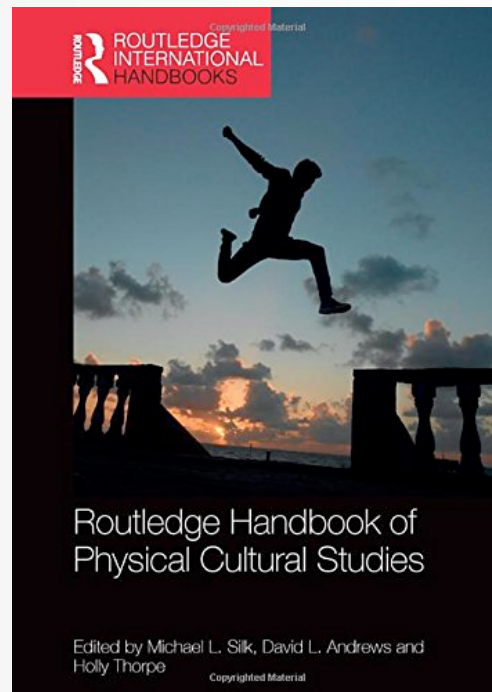


## Major AHRC Success for Paralympic Research
