A novel knowledge transfer partnership promoting long-term collaboration in pharmacoconomics



EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

On November 26, 2017, the UK-China Health and Economy Partnership Project, co-organized by Shandong University (SDU), Fudan University, Bournemouth University, University of York and University of East Anglia, was formally launched in Jinan.

This project aims to develop a long-term partnership between researchers from the two countries, promoting the long-term collaboration in pharmacoeconomics by knowledge innovation.

The purpose of this project is to get key UK and Chinese universities to change the ways they share pharmacoeconomics knowledge by developing a long-term educational collaborative that promotes improvements in patient and economic well-being.

Researchers from leading domestic universities and research institutes attended the launch event. After the ceremony, the delegates took part in a five-day workshop on theories and methodology of pharmacoeconomics.

INTRODUCTION



On November 26, 2017, the UK-China Health and Economy Partnership Project, co-organized by Shandong University (SDU), Fudan University, Bournemouth University, University of York and University of East Anglia, was formally launched in Jinan.

This project aims to develop a long-term partnership between researchers from the two countries, promoting the long-term collaboration in pharmacoeconomics by knowledge innovation.

During the launch ceremony, Darrin Baines, Professor of Health Economics at BU and Sun Qiang, Head of the School of Healthcare Management, SDU, gave detailed introductions to the project. Wang Fengshan, Associate Dean of Cheeloo College of Medicine, SDU, affirmed the importance of pharmacoeconomics in the field of healthcare, hoping that the collaboration and communication between UK and China would be enhanced. Representatives from funding organizations including Glaxosmithkline, the British Council and Fudan University, expressed their support for the UK-China Health and Economy Partnership.

Researchers from leading domestic universities and research institutes attended the launch event (Table 1). After the ceremony, the delegates took part in a five-day workshop on theories and methodology of pharmacoeconomics.

PURPOSE

The UK-China Health and Economy Partnership is a novel knowledge transfer partnership that will promote long-term collaboration between the universities of Fudan, Shandong, Bournemouth, East Anglia and York.



The purpose of this project is to get key UK and Chinese universities to change the ways they share pharmacoconomics knowledge by developing a long-term educational collaborative that promotes improvements in patient and economic well-being.

ACTIVITIES

The Health and Economy Partnership is currently building capacity and capability in pharmacoconomics designed to impact population health and economic development in China. The current project is funded until December 2018. During this time, planned knowledge transfer activities between delegates and the participating universities will be delivered. These include:

1. Growing the network to include key 20 Chinese universities involved in partnership activities and whose health economics experts are consulted by the Chinese government
2. Support for delegates with research projects, publications and joint funding applications
3. Production of a special issue of PharmacoEconomics on health economics in China
4. Academic visit to UK of representatives from Fudan and Shandong universities
5. Promoting the translation of key health economics textbooks from English to Chinese

These activities will help build a platform for leading academics from UK and China to share health economics knowledge. They will help the partnership enhance its activities by incorporating a focus on Chinese HTA systems and mechanisms in ways that benefit patients with faster access to cost-effective medicines.



Health and Economy Partnership Workshop – Course Evaluation Feedback Report
